

## ***Interactive comment on “Impact of two different types of El Niño events on runoff over the conterminous United States” by T. Tang et al.***

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The author explored the impact of two different type of El Nino (canonical-type and modoki-type) on runoff over the U.S. The topic treated here is quite interesting from both scientific and societal viewpoints. The impact of the present study must be huge because people in the US are very keen about such information. The analysis seem to be good for understanding their impacts in the present-day. However, it does not seem to be enough for the future response in a warmer climate as discussed in the following. Therefore, additional analysis may be necessary prior to acceptance.

1)The composite analysis by Figs. 1-7 seems to be enough to explore the impact of two different type of El Nino in the present-day. However, only Table 2 doesn't seem to be enough for exploring the future response in a warmer climate. It is better to add some figures related to the response to global warming, for example, same as Fig. 4,

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but for the period of 2050-2099. Also, the author should touch on the topic of how the two-types of El Nino will change in a warmer climate, for example, frequency, intensity, and its atmospheric response. Cai et al (2015) may be helpful for that discussion.
